I'm not a great one for claiming that I have a very rare this or that blowlamp, but it did surprise me that no one responded to two entries in the newsletters about the small French alcohol fuelled lamp shown in B/N 20 and its partial logo in B/N 21. Someone must have one, or at least something else bearing the logo. Put your thinking caps on and let us hear about it.


Burner tubes

- a) Is from a half-pint AMOR attributed to Frank Love. See previous comments about this firm and whether he made, or only marketed, lamps. The point of note about the burner is that its base is octagonal instead of the more popular hexagon. This could be a point in favour of Frank Love manufacturing lamps, or at least having them custom made for him. I cannot recall any other octagon-based burners and in any case there are several other quite characteristic features he displays on those of his lamps which are not obviously Bladons.
- b) is a most unusual paraffin burner tube seen on a ¾ pint Sievert "Paraffinia No1" The tube is of drawn brass but the tip appears to be cast and brazed on to the tube. The base of the burner has a most unusual sloping shape and is capped, with two small lugs clipping the cap into place within two holes in the side of the burner. The burner itself is fixed with a single small set screw through a hole in its side. The support bracket is soldered on to the shoulders of the tank and supports the tube by a circle of flat strip metal riveted on to the arms of the bracket. Another unique feature is that the air release screw has a circle of brass, let into a slot in the screw shank, to turn it instead of the usual single piece casting. I had thought that this was a "workshop" job but Ken Longden has one which is the same. Anyone else have one? Another unusual feature for Sievert is that the ignition recess or spirit cup is oval.
- c) is from a half pint Burridge, (as is the filler cap in B/N 21) called a
- "British Perfection Blowlamp". The side tube control is a patent concerned with the supply of fuel from the tank into the ignition cup. This patent is numbered 3126 and is dated 1904. Another point of interest to those collecting "users and uses" of blowlamps is that a Mr J Adams, trading as Burridge & Co, applied for a patent in 1898 for an attachment to fix to an "ordinary blowlamp" for soldering lead coffins!! It looked a bit like the one on show at Bloxham last April. I forget who owned it, but perhaps he could let me know if there is a Patent Number on the soldering attachment which I believe was fixed to a normal small Burridge.
- d) is from the later version of the Sievert "Rapid". The earlier Rapid was the one with the external lever which actuated the control valve through a slot in the burner tube. This was patented in 1896 with the number 11198. The tube for that version lacked the four slots around the circumference of the tube near to the constriction.

Apart from those differences the front feet were pointing sideways in the early version and forwards in the later one. Anyone any information on the date of these changes?
