#### Fourth Belgian Reunion

Saturday March 13<sup>th</sup> was yet another memorable day at the Belgian reunion at Mouscron. The new venue at Maison Picarde was in an old Trade Union Hall and offered greater accommodation in a beautiful hall whose walls were colourfully tiled with scenes of old Trade Union activities. Ample table space allowed better displays and more room to view exchanges, which as usual were the high light of the day. Perhaps the displays of the prized possessions were not as extensive as in previous years or maybe our eyes had become accustomed to seeing such sights. However, one of the most impressive lamps was a Sievert HSL No 3 standing nearly two feet tall and having no less than six coils in its preheat.

The meal we were offered in a neighbouring hotel across the Square was really something different. A full four course lunch with aperitif, onion soup, salmon, hot ham with vegetables followed by apple tart and coffee and accompanied (as Mick Marshall will testify!) by copious supplies of wine. There is no way we could hope to compete with that. The feeling of most was that afterwards there was little energy left but to repack our lamps and go home. Congratulations to Alain Henry for another outstanding success.

#### Third Blowlamp News General Meeting

Many will have seen the notices I distributed at Mouscron for our third meeting which is to be held on **Saturday May 8<sup>th</sup>**.

At that time the venue was undecided but was to be further West and roughly on the border of Kent and Surrey.

This idea of moving it is to encourage more of our members to come to enjoy a very friendly meeting and to see first hand not only the largest collection of blowlamps in one place that they are ever likely to see, but a variety of lamps such as we seldom see in this country. The real bonus, of course, is the opportunity of exchanges for some of these treasures.

All our continental friends are very keen to come again and are quite reconciled to driving another hour westwards along the motorway in order to enjoy a further meeting.

Despite Andy Feast's sterling work with the proprietors of Hever Castle, they would not back down from including the cost of entry to the Castle gardens in their quote for using their Pavilion for our meeting. That, with their provision of only a two course meal, without drinks, I felt was not acceptable. After all I believe the majority of people attending this meeting will be there for blowlamps rather than gardens.

So our meeting will be in Bletchingly Village Hall which is some three miles towards Redhill off Junction 6 of the M25. This hall, though a little more expensive than Great Chart, is nearly twice its size and offers much more convenient facilities for catering and parking. Also, there appears to be a plentiful supply of tables, but it would still be a great help if you brought your own stands.

For the ladies, Bletchingly itself is a pleasant old village with some historic buildings and several antique shops, while among other attractions within a mile or two is the historic working Outwood Windmill. ### LAMB TORCH & SOLDERING IRON

#### INSTRUCTIONS · FOR LIGHTING.

Unscrew Filler Cap at bottom of the barrel, and fill with clean petrole, Screw the Filler Cap on tightly.

Unscrew the Cap on Flame Tube and take out the Shutting Off Rod. Clean the Burner Nipple hole with one of the Cleaning Needles supplied for the purpose, access to the Nipple Hole being obtained by means of the wide slot in the Flame Tube.

Warm the neck of the Burner by holding in a gas jet flame for about 15 or 20 seconds, or with a lighted taper for about 25 seconds. If the Torch lights with a long white flame, vapourisation is not yet quite perfect, and a few seconds further warming of the Burner may be applied until a blue flame is obtained.

Adjust the Soldering Bit to one inch from the end of the Flame Tube, and tighten set Screw. When the Soldering Bit is sufficiently hot, slide it out until two inches from end of flame tube where it retains sufficient heat for its work.

When the Flame is required for brazing either remove Soldering Bit or swing the Soldering Bit clear of the Flame and tighten Thumb Screw.

To extinguish, blow out the flame, insert Shutting Off Rod in Flame Tube and screw down the Cap.

Do not use any other cleaner than the size supplied—if you enlarge the nipple hole you will spoil this, or any other Torch. Do not unnecessarily interfere with the other parts.

#### DO NOT REMOVE WICK.

We warrant the Torch to be successful if these INSTRUCTIONS ARE FOLLOWED, but not otherwise.

Sheila Cleaver has one and was told it was the starter lamp for a table lamp possibly petrol but make unknown. Andy Feast also has one but with a glass tank, Still no real identifying clues but thanks for the initial efforts.

#### **Burners**

- a) Barthel BM 0.14
- b) off the small 1/4 pint petrol Monitor 130
- c) Barthel No 61 Soldering torch

#### Filler caps

- a) The ½ pint Monitor 130 petrol as the burner (b)
- b) Barthel B M 0.14 as the burner (a)

#### Handles

a) Spiral steel faced pump handle off the 1 pint paraffin "NEVE".

A half pint "NEVE" was on show at Mouscron but apparently no further information on this or the other Dutch lamp manufacturer "HOSI". The answer to my question about the inscription being in English was that it was usual to use English as a universal language allowing export to other countries. So why not in their native language as well?

b) Plastic handle of Otto Bernz 2 pint with convex sided "bell" tank

#### Members' questions and some responses

Willy Mouton has sent me a photograph of a "Roma" which is a typical 1 pint paraffin lamp but its handle, which is original, is the same wound spring wire type as on Radius and Erikssons. "ROMA" is stamped into the tank. Any more variations on Frank Love's products? No response to Tom Bartlett's query on the "ACME" soldering torch but I've included some pictures of the two "Lamb" torches and the "Governor" torch which complete a quartet of English soldering torches. Anyone know of any others? I am indebted for the "Lamb" torch instructions to of all people - Ron Lamb!!

In response to John Wheeler's "Coleman/Monitor" cooker, Brian Grainger sent a rubbing, as shown here, of the name of a 1 pint paraffin lamp which is a typical, but unmarked, No 26. It has the perforated handle bearing the name "Monitor" embossed down its length.

John Tingle, as the owner of probably the most significant collection of No 26 lamps, do you have anything to add to this?

Malcolm Forster has made some discoveries about Wrights of Lymm, and confirms that they marketed but did not manufacture blowlamps. They were selling a range of Sievert lamps in the late 1950's and were apparently agents for Taymax lamps. So far there is no available history back to the date of the "Bladon" made "Firefly" which would appear to be late 1920-30 era. Tom Bartlett has one which has the Bladon pump valve which was patented in 1929. Will update you as information becomes available.




#### Warning note from Max Rhodes
