
Quizzes





Instructions for Use

Fill three parts full with best quality, clean Methylated Spirits, taking care that no impurities are present, i.e., dirt, oil, or other spirit.

See that filler screw washer is in good condition, occasionally tighten gland packing nut in front of control valve.

The lamp will not burn satisfactorily if the nozzle is not screwed on tightly.

To start up, fill well at top of Lamp with spirit, tighten filler screw, light spirit; this heats the vapouriser and causes the wick (which is inside the Lamp) to give off vapour

As soon as spirit is burnt away, turn on control valve, and apply light to nozzle - this should result in a pale flame.

In the nozzle is fitted a small copper pin, this should not be allowed to become detached.

In use, almost all the air consumed by flame has to be drawn up the rubber tube, and when gas is leaking, operator can detect it by the flame altering in colour.

Some of our Detector Lamps are fitted with patent nonreturn pressure pump; to operate this, valve must be held by thumb of left hand. The pump is fitted so that extra pressure in Lamp can be obtained, and it can also be used to fill the well for starting in the first place.

After putting a little pressure into Lamp, turn on control valve, hold hand over nozzle, and spirit will then flow back and settle in starting well.


It is bad practice and dangerous to light Lamp by placing in a gas flame or over a fire. The vapouriser, which is at the back of the nozzle is the only part that requires heat.


After continual use it may be necessary to fit fresh wick. This can be done through opening at bottom of Lamp.


B/N 29 Pump Lock
