First many thanks to all who kindly sent Christmas and New Year cards to Gina and me. I hope you all had a very enjoyable Christmas and that you saw in the New Year in a way suited to the occasion. I wish you all a very happy, healthy and successful New Millennium, whatever the purists say about next December 31st being the end of the old one. If you really believe that then I suppose it could be another excuse for a binge without the expense and embarrassment of another "River of Fire", "London Eye" and all the other things which did not go according to plan on the night. I've not yet decided whether I preferred the Sydney or Paris fireworks I saw on T V!

Anyway whatever you did, you certainly, at least most of you, did not rise to the bait to write to me with copy for this newsletter, but ---

Russell Harrower kindly sent me some information about Lake and Elliot.

His researches show they were a firm with the title "Lake and Elliot Jacks and Equipment Ltd" at the "Millennium Works" in Braintree, Essex. The business started in 1890 and though they were still in operation in 1974 there are apparently no records of them after 1980. They made, among other engineering equipment, both screw and hydraulic jacks. The former were marketed under the tradename "Midas" and the latter "Millennium"

Russell subscribes to the theory, which I feel is probably the correct one, that L & E bought the lamps in "blank" form and soldered on their "Millennium" plaque. But what was the significance of the number "11"? Further debate would be welcomed.

Arne Aasgaard has come up with the names of two Norwegian blowlamps to add to your lists of makers. "Standard" made by Hovik Verk of Oslo who were in business from 1900 until 1961 and who in later years made "Primus" under licence. "Fuhrmeister" made by Egil Fuhrmeister Metallvarefabrikk Co of Bergen from 1930 to late 1950's.

Brian Grainger reports another of the diamond shaped transfers as in B/N 29 on a Veritas-like ½ pint paraffin lamp with the square section handle. He raises the issue of whether the Primus inscribed burner on Andy Feast's was a replacement. Perhaps we'll have the opportunity to compare them at Bletchingly. He also asked if there was an answer to John Byrne's query in B/N 22 about the initials "T & W" on a British Safety Lamp. On a recent visit to Birmingham I found that

Turley and Williams were a firm of coppersmiths who were in business from at least 1913 but there were no records of them after 1956. Presumably like a number of the Birmingham firms involved they made blowlamps as a sideline, probably flourishing on wartime Government contracts and losing interest with the advent of L P G appliances. I was not able to trace any specific patents of theirs nor any registration of a trade name or mark.

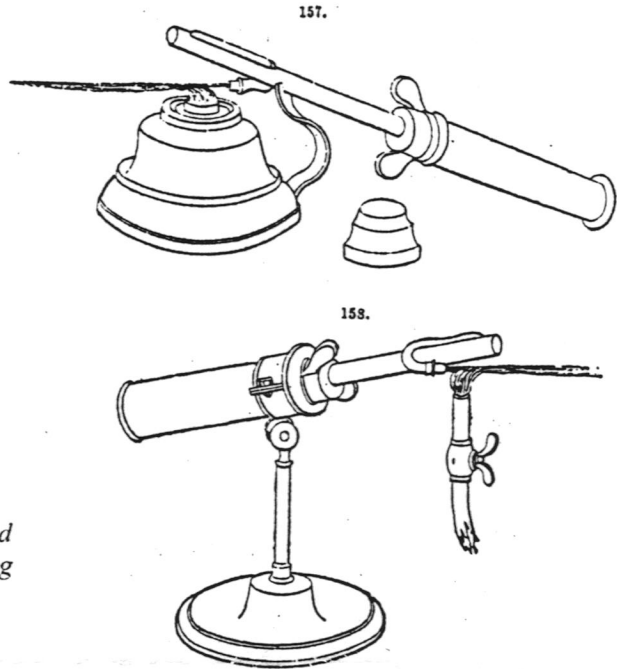
Spirit blowlamps

- is from a picture kindly supplied by **Eric Fagence** and is an Otto Bernz similar in the burner appearance to that of **Lee McGuckian** featured in B/N 9 but with folding handles.
- has already been shown, but is slightly different. It is a Lenk "Champion" No 30
- has not been identified. It was sent to me by **Ron Carr** from an internet transaction on EBAY. It looks remarkably like a copy of the Garratt and Fowler type lamps but its fuel tank appears to be made from sheet copper which has been nicely rolled at the top and bottom seams and appears to be round rather than oval in section like the G & F lamps. The blow tube is of brass with two brackets to locate it, the lower of which fits to the base of the tank. The wooden handle is well turned and decorated and fixed to the tank by a substantial brass ferrule. My feeling is that this was a very well finished work-shop made lamp but I am certainly open to correction. It was advertised as an early nineteenth century lamp.

John Tingle threw some more light on the date of the Garratt and Fowler with an interesting photocopy of a Buck and Hickman catalogue of 1889. This "Patent Plumbers' and Painters' lamp" is described as "Newly invented". It was said to cost around 3d. per day to run and was apparently available in three sizes. The size of the lamp illustrated, the plain one without the cut-off device and with the air entry at the base of the fuel reservoir, was not identified. Many thanks John. Does anyone else have some pictures of this which might help to sort out the sizes

Update on a drawing in B/N 20

These illustrations I found in a book called "Spons' Mechanics Own Book" dated 1898 in a section devoted to "Soldering - blowpipes and lamps". The book was apparently once owned in 1902 by George Weymarsh, who was a Plumber's Mate in the Royal Navy. Recognise the blowpipe? It is identical with the one I drew in B/N 20 which bore incomplete French markings. So, any more ideas, now we have some sort of date to work with? It is obviously much older than had been thought.



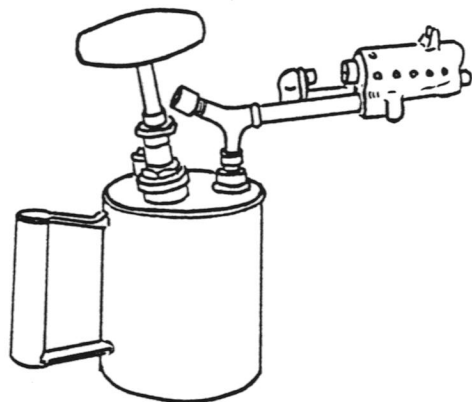
"---- Figs. 157 and 158 represent respectively the fixed and adjustable forms of the patent self-acting soldering lamps with blowpipes attached "

B/N 31 Trademarks

No response to the "Always Ready" logo I'm sending a photograph of the Schaeffer & Beyer to Ron Carr to include in "The Torch" to see if any of his members can enlighten us. The pump knob shape and locking device is certainly unique. In mine the control knob is a turned wooden lever. No comments so far on the "Dixon No 533". It is a 2 pint paraffin lamp of the standard shape with inclined burner. The handle is a flattened tube with the name "Dixon" embossed in it and the filler cap is hexagonal. It is owned, I understand, by John Wheeler and the logo drawing was presented by Tom Bartlett. It is surely one to add to the "marques of blowlamps" list.

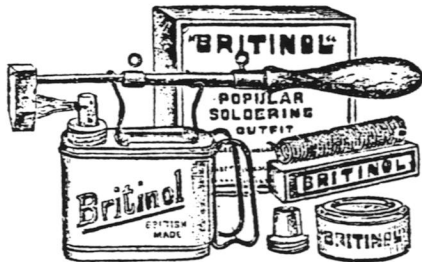

INSTRUCTIONS FOR USING "BRITINOL" FLUX CORED WIRE SOLDER

Although we recommend the use of the Britinol Telescopic Soldering Iron or the Britinol Self Blowing Spirit Lamp (both illustrated below), successful soldering can be done with this flux cord Wire Solder by means of any form of heat — a hot poker or nail, gas or candle flame or for small joints a lighted match or petrol lighter.

First clean the metals to be soldered with a file, knife or emery paper. This is not important providing the metals are moderately clean, although a better and stronger joint can be made when the metals are cleaned bright.

When the metal is warm, feed the Wire Solder gently on the work, evenly and bit by bit, the non-acid flux which is inside the Wire Solder flows on the job as it is needed thus ensuring a perfect soldering joint.

Another method is to place a small piece of the Wire Solder, (of a size just sufficient for the joint) on the work and heat as above until the solder flows.

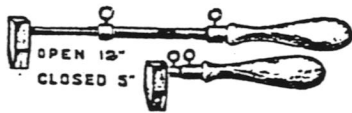
Use the Wire Solder sparingly, just sufficient for the job in hand.

DO NOT on any account use any other flux, this is unnecessary and may easily spoil the work.
