MOUSCRON 2000

The fifth annual reunion of the French and Belgian Club was another highly successful and enjoyable meeting at Mouscron, - renewing acquaintance with old friends and seeing loads of blowlamps, some unseen before, with plenty of swaps and purchases. One highlight was a working spirit lamp, a drawing of which appears later. I'm not sure of its name, but will check with our guests at Bletchingley. It attracted quite an audience and was interesting to see how the jet of flame issued from the nozzle. It looked in pristine condition so I wonder if it was original or a well reproduced replica. More later. As usual the food was magnificent and as Mick Marshall will testify the wine flowed freely. Also, as usual, our table arguably made the most noise! Those who have not been there should seriously consider if a couple of days can be taken next year to make the journey and see another dimension of blowlamp collecting. It can be done relatively easily in one day, especially if your base is near to Dover. "Le Shuttle" makes for a quicker journey and is totally painless, the journey the other side takes about an hour and a half but is mostly on motorway roads until the environs of Lille. After Lille the detailed map supplied by our host is quite clear and the blowlamp signposts well sited. You don't even notice driving on the wrong side of the road. B/N 32 lamps

Patsy O'Neill's lamp was identified by Taff as a Hauck No14 from which the control knob, wind cowl and ignition tray are missing. The control knob would be a cast iron ring with five spokes each terminating in a spherical knob. Tom Bartlett sent a photocopy of the range of five Hauck lamps of $1\frac{1}{2}$, 2, 4, 8 and 12 pints capacity while Keith Hawkins added the numbers, No 10 (2pints) 14 (4 pints) 15 (8 pints) and No 16 (12 pints). They were made by The Hauck Manufacturing Company of Brooklyn NY and had steel tanks. The $1\frac{1}{2}$, pint was fuelled by gasoline while the remainder used kerosene, but could be ordered for gasoline From Tom's illustrations the lamp looks more like a 2 pint but perhaps Patsy can let us know its capacity to confirm this. Thanks to all for the helpful information. The self acting lamp of B/N 32 and B/N 20 was identified by both Taff and Ted Rawson as a "De Coster" of about 1880 but apart from being French little else is known.

"Radia" a trademark of Maurice Lejeune who manufactured in Paris from about 1924 and also produced the "Canon 75" and soldering torches with the name "Excelsior". According to Ted Rawson they were made for export to Belgium and came in four sizes of large lamps with external preheat coils named as H, B, K, M, and three smaller sizes of 25, 35 and 50 cl capacity named C, V, Z. Keith Hawkins' information, however, is that there were 7 makes each of small and large brazing lamps. Named respectively 25,35, 35bis, 35bloc,35 P, 50P, 50PS and 0.6PS, 1PS, 1.2PS, 2.4PS, 2.4PSbis, 3PS, 3PSbis. The smaller lamps were in centilitre capacity while the brazing lamps were in Litres. (P= pump S= serpentia = preheat coil) but what is bis and bloc? Always more questions than answers, but many thanks for to the New Year resolutions. There has been much more info coming in this time!!

More "Millennium" news.

Russell Harrower added to his earlier information with some more about the firm. They were originally contractors to railway companies and supplied jacks for lifting rolling stock but were asked to provide a tool for defrosting frozen points. They duly purchased Barthel and other lamps of which they apparently modified the burners to suit the railways' requirements. No 11 was the eleventh off the drawing board. Later they made a small range of brazing lamps of their own. These are probably those which Keith Hawkins reports as two other "Millennium" lamps 2b of $7\frac{1}{2}$ pints and 10a of 5 pints with the addition of two lamps 80a and 80b made by Lake and Elliott under the name of "Express"

"APEX" continued

Peter Gold has recently returned from South Africa and has given some more information on APEX products, derived from a former director and I have had some correspondence with a non-member who is South African and had personal knowledge from a friend who once worked for APEX.

The firm, based just outside Johannesburg, apparently was in production from 1946 until 1978 when it closed down abruptly. There are two stories after that. One is that the firm was bankrupt and one day closed its doors, locking out its workforce. The other is that it was bought out by a competitor and then closed down. In addition to blowlamps they made cooking stoves of which it was said every African had one. They also made a heating stove which was based on their cooker with the addition of a polished reflector. The early cookers were based on the Optimus pattern but later modifications resembled Primus apparatus. With the starting of electrification the need for paraffin cookers diminished and a firm called Kadac, which was largely concerned with L P G apparatus, took over production but the products were not, so it was said, of good quality. Tanks were of steel and soon rusted.

There is some disagreement about how many types of lamp were manufactured. Peter quotes four models one each of 1 pint and 2 pint capacity in plain brass and plated with the succeeding company producing a plated lamp of two pint capacity bearing a modified APEX logo My other informant says only one model was made - the 1 pint lamp. So we await more clarification, but thank you Peter.

The first blowlamp?

Mike Wareham sent me, with his Christmas card, a small cutting which he says comes from a childrens' book of inventions and machinery. "James Rhodes of Cincinnati Ohio USA developed and patented the idea of a mineral-oil vapour lamp in 1862 but never so far as is known made one." It is well documented that the first patented and working petrol fuelled blowlamp is attributed to C R Nyberg and later manufactured by Max Sievert. At the same time the Lindqvist brothers were working with paraffin fuelled lamps and cookers. However the plot thickens, for another Swede Ludwig Holm should apparently be considered for the first honour and it has even been suggested that the others derived their ideas from him. Like many mysteries this may never be solved. Anyone anything else to add to this?

Snippets of information.

Brian Grainger reports a Barthel "Little Wonder" with a swastika on the filler cap and another "Little Wonder" purchased in America which bears the inscription "Van Praag Sales Corp New York" stamped into the opposite side of the tank from the "Easter Egg" logo of Barthel (and thus stamped before construction) This appears to be a similar state of affairs to the Optimus "American" brand where a European maker produces specifically for the American market. Keith Hawkins states that there were four lamps of this brand. No 5(1 litre) 32 (1 litre?) 38 (½. Litre) with traditional U S A tanks No 48 (½, L) was a flat tank toolbox lamp (editor's note:- Keith has excelled himself this time)

An apology.

I wrongly attributed the drawing (a) of the spirit lamp in B/N 31 to a picture supplied by Eric Fagence which should have been to Hilton Shackley. This is an Otto Bernz No 30 and was purchased by Hilton during a visit to the States. A nice little lamp.

Post Office Project


