

B/N 33 Drawings

"Two Tigers" logo

This is on a ½ pint paraffin lamp of the standard type pattern like Veritas, Phoemax and a number of other unmarked lamps with brass domed nuts fastening the black, six sided composition handle to the tank and the burner support bracket to the front of the tank. The logo is attributed to the Fletcher Hardware Co Ltd of Edgbaston Road Birmingham. A photocopy from "The Ironmonger Diary" of 1922 kindly sent in by Sylvia Black describes "Two Tigers" Hardware without specifying blowlamps, so it looks as though they marketed other hardware and, indeed, on the same page of this catalogue are two other Trade Marks attributed to Fletcher Hardware. There are many instances where otherwise "blank" blowlamps of a similar type bear different transfers of their marketing agents but we do not know for certain who made the original "blank" lamps.

Sylvia also has a 1 pint paraffin lamp similar to the Veritas and Phoemax which has the remains of a Red and Gold transfer which could well read "Duo-burn". Anyone any further information on this?

Spirit lamps

The twin tube torch photograph I took of a lamp owned by Trevor Bold which he displayed at Mouscron this year. It is a "Joss Elve", is Austrian and also bears an inscription or name of "Ricofort" Anyone have anything to add to this?

The other spirit lamp is a modern replica which was beautifully presented and attracted considerable attention to see it working at this year's Mouscron reunion

The Filler cap and Handle are both from a French Rippes No 1 lamp. The filler incorporates a spring loaded safety valve

BROWNBOGGS Co.

No history is available, apart from the fact it was based in Hamilton Michel Duval kindly sent a photograph of a ½ litre version with the name plate soldered on to the front of the tank

A significant feature is the round brass spirit tray (most large American and Canadian lamps have cast iron spirit trays) and the tank has parallel sides, without the traditional bell-shaped bottom. The filler cap is very much like the Barthel, with the large bell-shaped brass blade perforated to cover the air release and prevent its loss. As there appears to be a control knob at the back of the burner, which would indicate a petrol lamp, an air release would not only be superfluous but a positive danger. Thus is this filler cap a replacement?

Snippets and Queries

Tom Bartlett confirms that John Wheeler's large lamp featured in B/N 17 was made by Clayton and Lambert with the type number 65. Again this must be a tribute to Tom's ubiquitous notebook which I'm sorry I didn't start at the beginning of my collection. Maybe if I had, I should have more answers by now and it is certainly a piece of good advice to anyone starting a collection. Thanks Tom.

Keith Hawkins sent a photocopied page about Optimus "American" lamps, confirming his information published in B/N 33

Norman Penny reported meeting a man at a show who had, as part of an Open University course, investigated Tilley heating lamps and suggested improvements. His thesis runs to some fourteen pages with some remarkably fine exploded drawings and detail of these lamps and is most interesting He has donated the original to the Blowlamp Society Archive for use in future newsletters. If anyone would like any special extracts from this, please let me know. I'll include some detail from time to time but some of the drawings are on A3 paper which is a bit too big for us.

Norman also sent a photocopy of a 1913 Dutch catalogue which clearly shows two variants of the Sievert "mushroom" filler cap. All the lamps have the old wire safety devices. This tends to disprove the half century commemoration theory for their use



Both suggest that "bis" could represent a variant of an original type number e.g. a conventional nozzle or flattened tip for paint burning. "bloc" has both still puzzled. The suggestion is that a French colleague might give us some clues. Keith also noted that he had seen "basse" after a lamp's designation. That too needs further definition

Ray Hyland wants information about the "Acme". One of very few types of English-made soldering torches. Anyone any clues on who made them and where?

Taff phoned a request about a Burridge look-alike lamp called "The Sunbeam" Anyone any information? Hopefully he will have it at Stourpaine for the other experts to assess. Brian Grainger was especially pleased to have some original flexible hose at Bletchingly John Trippick is looking for :- Primus 606, Pr.607, "Imp" English "Reliance" Bladon B65



In an earlier B/N I reported that two people asked me at Stourpaine a couple of years or so ago about a Harley Davidson blowlamp which they swore they had seen. Michel Duval has probably shed some light on this with a photocopy of a lamp which was included in a "winterisation" kit of H-D motor cycles produced for wartime use in Russia This is almost identical with the C & L tool-box torch but the tank side appears to be plain without the heart shaped embossing which contained the C & L logo. The sketch given me by these two people shows this embossing which enclosed the H-D logo. Anyone seen one?







INSTRUCTIONS FOR USING

The Lamb Blow Lamp No. 1

(BRITISH MADE.)



TO FILL

Unscrew Cap and fill about three parts full with best **BENZOLINE or PETROL**; replace Cap and screw down tightly.

TO START LAMP

Hold burner over a gas jet for about a minute until gas is formed, when the lamp will light up and be ready for immediate use.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS

The burner nipple of lamp should be cleaned on each occasion it is used, and with no other needle than that supplied with Lamp; if this is not done, the nipple hole will be choked, and in addition, the lamp will burn badly and lose power. Another point is to be sure that there is no escape of pressure at filling cap; see that the cork washer in same is perfect, otherwise the lamp will lose pressure.
