BOOKS

Some of you will have seen the first ever printed book on blowlamps. called "Collectible Blowtorches" by Dick Sarpolus who is a member of the American Blowtorch Collectors Association. He has put together in his book chapters on collecting, restoring and polishing blowtorches, with some history of their origins and uses; also information on some of the manufacturers. Understandably the emphasis is on American lamps but there is some mention of European lamps. The 295 colored (N.B. the "Yank" spelling!) photographs which are his own work are really magnificent and certainly show his exhibits to great advantage. To European collectors some of the illustrations are the stuff of dreams, or successful E-bay bidding with a bottomless purse. He does, however, give some indication of rarity and valuation and on the whole his suggested prices appear to be reasonable. Inevitably this, or indeed any book, cannot pretend to be an exhaustive study of the subject but there is much there to enlighten collectors about what might be available with some luck. I am sure some will find some small errors but I feel that a second edition will correct the few that I have detected and that most of any future alterations will be a considerable addition to the photographs and data. 
B/N 36 ILLUSTRATIONS

- (a) Otto Eichelsheim of Dusseldorf (courtesy of Willy Mouton) the handle (a) is from their "Vulcan" No 201 which is the spirit lamp illustrated in this newsletter
- (b) Khotal is a puzzle The lamp looks to be a typical paraffin English or Swedish lamp but its spirit tray resembles an American torch and it is advertised by the American firm of Eimer & Amend of New York. The name however sounds distinctly Indian.
- (c) Nothing known about this neat logo- It appears on a spirit mouth blowlamp shown by Norman Penny at Winterbourne and is another one for those who collect diamond shaped transfers







Snippet :- The pump locking device in B/N 10 is seen on a "Thermidor" by Samuel Heath yet the patent is attributed to Parkinson & Cowan (Monitor)!

B/N 35 FILLER CAP

Lidgerwood Some interesting information from Michel Duval with extracts from a Lidgerwood catalogue. They were a French firm of marketing agents and their catalogue contained different lamps which had been manufactured by others.

Among their illustrations is a picture of a vertical lamp bearing the circular name plaque of Kelite (B/N 11). This is identical with the Bladon I have illustrated with the Tangye plaque. I had thought that the pump knob on my lamp was an old drawer handle as a D I Y restoration until I saw the advertisement for Tangye engine lamps. The significance of the numbers 3047 and 3048 is still not clear. Does no one of the Stationary Engine fraternity know whether this is a Bladon number or a Tangye number?

HERCULES

I had asked the question about this brand name in B/N 4 but had no response. I now have three Hercules and John Tingle is sending me details of an unusual Hercules he has recently acquired.

The Logo in B/N 4 (b) is probably incomplete as the transfer on my lamp is very indistinct.

If anyone has the lettering which appears in the upper half of the circle please let me know so I can complete the logo. The idea of the "Self Generator" is that it is fitted with a rapid starting device similar in function to the Sievert and Optimus "Quickstart". Both these lamps are typical two pint American style lamps. The third logo is on a small, probably spirit, lamp similar to but smaller than the Lenk. It is also to be noted from Dick Sarpolus book that this logo is identical with that on a similar small spirit lamp called a FULTON where that name replaces the diagonal Hercules name. Now where did this brand originate?

My first Hercules looks distinctly Otto Bernz, with the same chunky pump housing and identical locking device. I've drawn the two pump knobs to show their similarity

On the other hand the Self Generator has many Turner characteristics. For example

its pump knob is identical, apart from the inscribed trapeze artist, and the control knob of black plastic is similar to the later Turners. This latter lamp also has the name Hercules cast into the side of the burner nozzle.

Who else has some Hercules models to tell me about? Sketches or photographs please.



"JET" AUTOMATIC BLOW LAMP



PILOT WICK

INSTRUCTIONS FOR USE

• To fill, unscrew the two bottom caps and fill within half an inch of the top with methylated spirits.

· Do not use any other kind of fuel.

• Replace both bottom caps, screwing them on firmly, place the lamp on its side to allow the wick to be thoroughly saturated then top up wick tube with more methylated spirits to replace the spirits absorbed by the wick. This is only necessary on the first using of the lamp, as with the caps replaced after every using of the lamp the wick remains saturated and it is only necessary to top up with more spirits.

• With the lamp upright, remove the top cap of the pilot wick tube and the small cap from the blow pipe, adjust the blow pipe so that its tip is the centre of the pilot wick,

then light the wick.

• The lamp should start to blow in a few moments. To hasten the warming up, hold the lamp at an angle of 45 degrees, pointing downwards, so that the pilot flame heats up the blow pipe nozzle.

The flame can be adjusted by changing the up and down position of the blow pipe nozzle in relation to the

pilot tube.

• Should the flame die off, this may be due to an air lock. To remedy, turn the lamp upside down for a couple of seconds while burning.

 Do not let the lamp run dry, as this may burn the wick. A small piece of wire is enclosed for cleaning the jet

should the flame be crooked or spiral.

• The blow lamp should, with proper care, last a lifetime as it is solidly constructed; but in the event of accidental damage, spares may be obtained from the makers.
